2024 YEAR IN REVIEW

HEALTH 🗘

- 229 homebound Pettis County seniors were delivered meals through the Sedalia Senior Center. These are individuals who would otherwise not have access to a nutritious lunch
- 565 people were provided health and personal hygiene items through the Salvation Army
- 26 Pettis County families received financial assistance for Children's Mercy Hospital medical bills for needed healthcare
- 34 people were served by ABA Therapy through the Center for Human Services
- 427 people participate in the Spiritual Health Care Program through New Life Community Impact Center
- 150 people received food at Community Café, both in monthly meals and in providing to-go materials for those in need
- 103 foster children were served by Birthday Blessings, aiding in mental health and showing overall support

EDUCATION

- 1,740 Pettis County students received school supplies through C.A.C.T.U.S.
- 123 people were served by the Girl Scout Leadership Experience involving STEM, the outdoors, life skills, and entrepreneurship
- Over 1,300 people were served by the Civil Air Patrol through various programs (Cadet and Aerospace Education, Veterans Day Ceremonies, local parades and fairs, and Emergency Services)
- 75 scouts and families received financial assistance for membership, program and activity fees, and uniforms and books to participate in Scouting America, Great Rivers Council, educational programs that build skills and development for leadership
- 239 people received education and support for the visually impaired, blind, their families and peers through the Blind of Central MO
- 1,124 children participated in Project Learn through Boys and Girls Clubs of West Central Missouri
- 2,445 people received Pettis County Education and Prevention training through Child Safe of Central Missouri
- 470 people were impacted by the Retrieving Freedom service dog education and exposure

FINANCIAL STABILITY

- 67 individuals received financial assistance to enable individuals with developmental disabilities to obtain items and services needed through the Association for Persons with Disabilities
- 285 people received services through Pettis County Community Partnership community closet and financial assistance
- 33 young adults participated in Path to Purpose a program through Show-Me Christian Youth Home that provides support for successful transition to adulthood and economic self-sufficiency
- 731 people were served by the Emergency Utility and Work Attire program through Open Door Service Center
